| Report Title: | Extension of the Norfolk Street Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO) | | | |

1 Purpose / Summary

1.1 To extend the Norfolk Street passageway PSPO by a further 3 years.

2 Key Issues

- 2.1 As per Appendix One, there is a PSPO in place which prevents access through a passageway located between Norfolk Street and West Street in Wisbech.
- 2.2 This Order expires on the 18th July 2026
- 2.3 PSPOs are made under the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014.
- 2.4 There is no cost to the Council in extending this Order save for Officer time and printing costs.
- 2.5 A Consultation has been carried out, including formal letters to identified statutory consultees and a wider public survey which ran between August 26th 14th September 2025.
- 2.6 A summary of the public consultation is at Appendix Two
- 2.7 Consultation was undertaken in accordance with legislation, and the following were consulted:
 - The Chief Constable of Cambridgeshire Constabulary (statutory)
 - Wisbech Neighbourhood Policing Inspector
 - The Police and Crime Commissioner of Cambridgeshire (statutory)
 - Cambridgeshire County Council Highway
 - Wisbech Town Council
 - District Ward Councillors
 - Wisbech Fire and Rescue
 - Businesses in and around the affected area
 - Residents and landlords in and around the affected area
- 2.8 The above consultees were all in favour of extending the Order a summary can be found at Appendix Two.

- 2.9 Legal advice has been received to ensure the process followed accords with legislation.
- 2.10 The legislation can be found at Chapter 2 Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014.
- 2.11 Appendix Three is the wording of the proposed Order.
- 2.12 Following legal advice, the wording has been altered to the proposed Order in comparison to the original Order. This has been highlighted in yellow within Appendix Three. This change does not affect the proposed renewal as no changes have been made to the prohibitions or requirements.
- 2.13 If the Order is extended, we will have to publicise the approved extension and notify Wisbech Town Council and Cambridgeshire County Council.

3 Recommendations

3.1 To approve the extension of the PSPO for a further 3-year period which prevents access through a passageway located between Norfolk Street and West Street in Wisbech.

4 BACKGROUND AND INTENDED OUTCOMES

4.1 The Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014, hereafter known as the Act, came into effect on 20th October 2014 making a number of changes to the law on anti-social behaviour. A key change was the introduction of PSPOs to replace DPPOs, dog control orders and gating orders in addition to a range of other behaviours that local authorities can now regulate in public spaces

- 4.2 The Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014 gives power to Local Authorities to create PSPOs if they are satisfied that activities carried on in a public place within the authority's area have had a detrimental effect on the quality of life of those in the locality, or it is likely that activities will be carried on in a public place within that area and that they will have such an effect. The second condition is that the effect, or likely effect, of the activities is, or is likely to be persistent, unreasonable and justifies the introduction of the Order.
- 4.3 Public Space Protection Orders (PSPOs) are intended to deal with a particular nuisance or problem in a particular area that is detrimental to the local community's qualify of life, by imposing conditions on the use of that area which apply to everyone. They are designed to ensure the law-abiding majority can use and enjoy public spaces, safe from anti-social behaviour
- 4.4 PSPOs can be drafted based on the specific issues being faced in a particular public space and can include multiple restrictions and requirements in one Order. Examples of restrictions might include:
 - controlling dogs
 - restricting access to an area
 - misuse of substances
 - tackling noise nuisance
 - tackling unreasonable behaviour having a detrimental effect on the community
- 4.5 Section 60(2) of the Act states: Before the time when a public spaces protection order is due to expire, the local authority that made the order may extend the period for which it has effect if satisfied on reasonable grounds that doing so is necessary to prevent—
 - (a)occurrence or recurrence after that time of the activities identified in the order, or
 - (b)an increase in the frequency or seriousness of those activities after that time.
- 4.6 Based on the response of the community consultation, Fenland District Council are satisfied that the original associated anti-social behaviour, namely litter, urination, defecation, drugs, drinking and sexual activity, has reduced within the passageway, because of the PSPO. If the PSPO were not to be renewed, anti-social behaviour would likely return.
- 4.7 A PSPO can be extended for up to 3 years. Legislation requires there to be a review before the 3-year period expires. The outcome of the review can lead to a renewal, amendment or removal of the existing PSPO. It is proposed that the PSPO sought is made for a full 3-year period and with no amendments to the restrictions.

5 REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

- 5.1 The passageway had been identified as a location for anti-social behaviour including urination, defecation and litter, the impact of which was having a detrimental impact upon the local community.
- 5.2 Following our community consultation with local businesses, residents and landlords, and enquiries conducted with Fenland District Council Streetscene team the PSPO was introduced in July 2023. The introduction of the PSPO has mostly prevented the associated anti-social behaviour from continuing. However, litter continues to be a nuisance at the gate entrance, albeit not at the same level of severity as compared to prior to the Order coming into place. The extension of the Order is believed necessary, as prescribed in points (a) & (b) of Section 60(1) above, to prevent occurrence or recurrence or an increase in the frequency or seriousness of those activities.

6 CONSULTATION

- 6.1 Legislation states who must and could be consulted. This is stated within S.72 of the Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014.
- 6.2 Consultation was conducted with the following:
 - Chief Constable of Cambridgeshire Constabulary (statutory)
 - Police and Crime Commissioner (statutory)
 - Wisbech Neighbourhood Policing Inspector
 - Wisbech Town Council
 - District Ward Councillors
 - Wisbech Fire and Rescue
 - Cambridgeshire County Council Highways
- 6.3 Further evidence was provided by the Wisbech Neighbourhood Policing Team and FDC Streetscene, this can be found within Appendix Two.
- 6.4 Residents (and their landlords) and local businesses within the locality were written to about the proposed extension and invited to provide their comments.
- 6.5 Six local businesses were visited in person by members of staff from the Community Safety Team to discuss the proposed renewal and seek their views on whether they support this.

- 6.6 A survey was placed on the FDC website and shared on the FDC Facebook page from 26/09/2025 until the 14/09/2025, inviting views on the proposal.
- 6.7 A summary of responses can be found in Appendix Two.
- 6.8 Out of 43 responses, 100% supported the extension of the PSPO.

7 ALTERNATIVE OPTIONS CONSIDERED

- 7.1 The other options are to allow the Order to expire or to extend with an amendment.
- 7.2 If the Order were allowed to expire then we would likely see a return of the associated anti-social behaviour to the passageway.
- 7.3 It is not felt necessary to seek an amendment to the Order based upon consultation feedback, save for those suggested by our legal advisers.

8 IMPLICATIONS

8.1 Legal Implications

8.2 The legal implications are as detailed within the main body of the report. Fenland District Council is statutorily empowered to take the action proposed and has fulfilled its wider obligations by undertaking a period of consultation as well as seeking input from legal advisers at the commencement of the renewal process of putting this proposal together for consideration.

- 1. This Order shall come into operation on 18th 2014 **2023** and shall have effect for a period of 3 years from that date.
- 2. This Order relates to the areas as shown hatched in red on the attached Plans in Schedules 1 (the 'Restricted Area'); and applies to all the land which is open to the air and to which the public are entitled or permitted to have access (with or without payment). For the purposes of this paragraph, any land which is covered is to be treated as land which is "open to the air" if it is open to the air on at least one side.
- 3. The effect of this Order is to impose the following prohibitions and requirements on the Restricted Area as specified as follows:

4.1. In the Restricted Area shown in Schedule 1a and Schedule 1b:

Unless an employee of Fenland District Council or a member of the emergency services, in either case acting within their capacity, no person is to access or attempt to access the Restricted Area or to tamper or attempt to tamper with the gates at either end of the Restricted Area

- 5. It is an offence for a person without reasonable excuse to do anything prohibited by this Order, or to fail to comply with a prohibition or requirement to which a person is subject to pursuant to this Order.
- 6. A Constable or an 'Authorised Person' may issue a Fixed Penalty Notice (FPN) to anyone he or she has reason to believe has committed an offence under this Order.
- 7. An 'Authorised Person' and 'an authorised officer of the Council' means any person authorised in writing for the purposes of this Order by Fenland District Council (the Council). A Constable means a Police Constable in whatever capacity including a Community Support Officer.
- 8. A person found to be in breach of this Order is liable upon summary conviction to a fine not exceeding level 3 on the standard scale (currently £1000.00); or to be made subject to a FPN

- 9. "The Council is satisfied that the two conditions below have been met, in that:
- (a) activities carried on in the designated area as stated below, have had a detrimental effect on the quality of life of those in the locality, or it is likely that these activities will be carried on in the public place and that they will have such an effect.

The said activities include: Litter, urination, Defecation

(b) that the effect, or likely effect of the activities described above, is, or is likely to be, of a persistent or continuing nature, is, or is likely to be, such as to make the activities unreasonable, and justifies the restrictions imposed by this Order

The Council believe that it is reasonable to impose the above prohibitions and requirements in order to prevent the detrimental effect from continuing, occurring or recurring, and to reduce that detrimental effect or to reduce the risk of its continuance, occurrence or recurrence

10. Any interested person (an individual who lives or regularly visits or works) in the restricted area who desires to question the validity of this Order on the grounds that the Council had no power to make it or that any requirement of the Act has not been complied with in relation to this Order, may apply to the High Court within six weeks from the date upon which this Order is made.







Further evidence was provided by the Wisbech Neighbourhood Policing Team and the Fenland District Council Streetscene team. They were not statutory consultees but provided evidence.

Wisbech Neighbourhood Policing Team provided the following data which was searched using the relevant Postcode of which the passageway is situated within.

A limitation of this data is that the Police were unable to isolate the data specifically to the passageway, but rather the Postcode areas around it. As the Passageway is a very small area in comparison with the whole Postal code areas searched, it is difficult to clearly define in data terms the exact impact the PSPO has had. The Fenland NPT inspector does support for the renewal and commented that 'Removal of the PSPO will undoubtedly have a negative impact locally.'

The Streetscene team provided that no Fixed Penalty Notices have been issued by themselves for the Norfolk Street PSPO.

In August 2025 letters were sent out to 20 addresses in the local geographical area. These were previously identified as a mixture of residents, property landlords and



nearby businesses who could be affected by the proposal. We provided an explanation that we were starting the renewal process of the PSPO and asked for comments on whether they supported a potential renewal. We also provided a physical copy of the questionnaire which was due to go out to the public online. We asked recipients to respond within 21 days by either using the self-addressed envelope, emailing the Community Safety team's shared inbox, or calling the Fenland District Council landline. 2 official responses were received from 2 property landlords, who were in support of the renewal, this is referenced in the above table.

As part of the consultation process, we produced and circulated an online survey through the Fenland District Council website, and social media pages. The survey was live between the 26th of August 2025 and the 14th of September 2025.

43 individuals completed the survey, with 100% supporting the renewal of the PSPO. The results of this are shown below, including an opportunity for comments to be made.

Q1 1. In what capacity do you wish to respond to this consultation?




Q2 2. What is your postcode?



Q3 3. Which age band best describes you?




Q4 4. How far do you agree or disagree with the proposed extension to the Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO) limiting access to the passageway?



Q5 5. Are you aware that the Order was put in place due to anti-social behaviour associated with the passage?




Q6 6. Have you experienced any issues in relation to anti-social behaviour in relation to the passage since the Order became effective?





We received 18 comments. Some comments reflected on the safety concerns if the PSPO was not renewed. One person explained they had seen how the passageway had

There was desire for other areas of the town to be covered by the legislation. The Community Safety Team will consider this in full in due course.

The Council believe that it is reasonable to impose the above prohibitions and requirements in order to prevent the detrimental effect from continuing, occurring or recurring, and to reduce that detrimental effect or to reduce the risk of its continuance, occurrence or recurrence

The Council has had particular regard to the rights of freedom of expression and freedom of assembly set out in articles 10 and 11 of the European Convention on Human Rights.

10. Any interested person (an individual who lives or regularly visits or works in the restricted area) who desires to question the validity of this Order on the grounds that the Council had no power to make it or that any requirement of the Act has not been complied with in relation to this Order, may apply to the High Court within six weeks from the date upon which this Order is made.

When an application is made, the High Court can decide to suspend the operation of the Order pending the Court's decision in part or in totality. The High Court has the ability to uphold the Order, quash it or vary it.



The Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014, hereafter known as the Act, came into effect on 20th October 2014 making a number of changes to the law on anti-social behaviour. A key change was the introduction of PSPO's to replace Designated Public Places Orders (DPPO's), dog control orders and gating orders in addition to a range of other behaviours that local authorities can now regulate in public spaces.

The Act has introduced simpler, more effective powers to tackle anti-social behaviour that provide better protection for victims and communities. This includes the introduction of Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO).

Councils will be responsible for making the new PSPO although enforcement powers will be much broader.

Public Space Protection Orders (PSPO's) are intended to deal with a particular nuisance or problem in a particular area that is detrimental to the local community's qualify of life, by imposing conditions on the use of that area which apply to everyone. They are designed to ensure the law-abiding majority can use and enjoy public spaces, safe from anti-social behaviour.

PSPO's are drafted based on the specific issues being faced in a particular public space, and can include multiple restrictions and requirements in one order. Examples of restrictions might include:

- Controlling the use of dogs;
- Restricting access to an area;
- Misuse of substances;
- Tackling noise nuisance; or
- Unreasonable behaviour having a detrimental effect on the community.

A PSPO can be made where the council is satisfied, after conducting the test, that the activity or activities, carried on in a public place, it proposes to restrict:

- Have had, or are likely to have, a detrimental effect on the quality of life of those in the locality;
- Is, or is likely to be, persistent or continuing in nature;
- Is, or is likely to be, unreasonable; and
- Justifies the restrictions imposed.

A PSPO can be used to restrict access to an area where the test has been met.

We also sought the opinion of the Fenland District Council (FDC) Streetscene team.

All consultees were in favour of extending the Order.

A Public Consultation was carried out between the 26/08/2025 and the 14/09/2025, this included letters sent to residents/businesses in the locality, Community Safety Officers visiting businesses in the locality, and a public online survey. The public online survey saw 43 responses, with 100% supporting extending the Order.
